to negative consequences and suffering.



5. Uttam Shauch Dharma (Supreme Contentment): Contentment and purity come from recognizing one's

spiritual essence and avoiding greed. It leads to a peaceful and revered life.

6. Uttam Sanyam Dharma (Supreme Renunciation): Renunciation of worldly attachments and passions leads to

spiritual freedom and acclaim.

7. Uttam Tap Dharma (Supreme Austerity): Selfdiscipline and control over desires purify the soul and lead to

spiritual growth.

8. Uttam Tyag Dharma (Supreme Self Restraint): Controlling desires for wealth and power, and practicing charity, brings spiritual bliss and freedom.

9. Uttam Aakinchanya Dharma (Supreme Possession less): Recognizing that material possessions are illusory and focusing on spiritual essence leads to liberation.

10. Uttam Brahmacharya Dharma (Supreme Celibacy): Abstaining from sensual pleasures and focusing on

spiritual wisdom helps overcome worldly attachments and achieves spiritual elevation.

To commemorate this occasion, students performed the short skits based on various ten virtues - 'Das Lakshan' during the school morning assembly, illustrating the festival's importance and teachings of the enlightened souls.
